## Harbormaster Waypoint 3/2017

Fellow Boaters:

Once again Labor Day has come and gone, marking the unofficial end of summer, and like last year, the weather did not cooperate. In 2016 the Labor Day weekend was spoiled by Tropical Storm Hermine, and 7 vessels ended up on the beach. In the last waypoint, I mentioned the new stickers we began using this year. My own observation is that they seem to be holding up very well. If you have any feedback on the stickers – good or bad - I'd be glad to hear it.

As the season winds down, for those of you who have not used your mooring in 2017, a reminder: the Harbor Ordinance requires that you have the boat you registered to the mooring/outhaul <u>ON</u> the mooring/outhaul for at least 20 days during the season or you risk losing it. If you are having a problem meeting this requirement, please contact the Harbor Office.
