TREATMENT PLANT

- Veolia started the week of September 11th with staff reviewing operations at the water treatment facility. A senior level manager and operator has begun the process of reviewing all of our procedures for safety and treatment operation. They will be assisting the Town with updating and developing standard operating procedures for the facility.
- Water department staff worked with our process control engineering consultant with installing a
 new chemical feed pump and integrating it with our SCADA system. This new pump replaces an
 older generation of equipment that is no longer supported by the manufacturer.

TRANSFER PUMPING/RESERVOIR

The water department suspended transferring water from south pond to north pond.

DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

South Pond @ 6 MG Usable Storage, 6 Million Gallons

North Pond @ 49 MG Usable Storage 60 Million Gallons


- Service line installation is complete on High Street. The water department staff connected 9 existing
 residential services to the new watermain. Crews will complete the distribution main switch over
 at Clinton Avenue intersection and then the disconnecting of the old main from the water tower.
- Crews from Atlas Painting have been onsite erecting the staging for preparing and painting the south tower. Contractors for Verizon have also been onsite installing new equipment on the North Tower that was recently painted and decommissioning the equipment on the south tower. The Contractor for AT&T will be onsite the week of September 18th to temporarily locate the antenna to the staging so that Atlas can install tarps to contain the painting work.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT


- The monthly average daily flow at the treatment plant for July was 0.22 million gallons per day.
 The monthly average allowed by our discharge permit is 0.73 million gallons per day. The peak daily flow was 0.40 million gallons.
- We received 8 statements of qualifications from engineering consultants responding to the
 advertisement. Staff has reviewed the statements and we have narrowed the field for interviews.
 Work will include assessing all of our wastewater facilities including collection system, pump
 stations, and wastewater treatment plant and providing recommendations for improvements, design
 and permitting, and assisting the Town through construction.




Transfer Pumping NORTH POND WATER QUALITY




RESERVOIR LEVEL




- Crews from Atlas Painting started sandblasting the south water tower on October 2nd. They are

 applied over the next week or two based upon weather conditions.
- A water service upgrade was completed for 115 Melrose Avenue to the newly constructed home on the property.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

- The monthly average daily flow at the treatment plant for September was 0.25 million gallons per day. The monthly average allowed by our discharge permit is 0.73 million gallons per day. The peak daily flow was 0.53 million gallons.
- We have interviewed two of the eight consultants that provided statements of qualifications for wastewater facilities assessment and improvements. The staff has recommended one of the firms and I am working with the project manager to develop a scope of work, fee, and terms for a contract. Unfortunately I am not prepared to make a recommendation to the Commission for the October 16th meeting. Work will include assessing all of our wastewater facilities including collection system, pump stations, and wastewater treatment plant and providing recommendations for improvements, design and permitting, and assisting the Town through construction.



TICK TASKFORCE: LYME AND TICK-BORNE DISEASE PREVENTION, EDUCATION, AND RESEARCH

No. 2023-17

- WHEREAS, the Town of Jamestown along with all communities within the State of Rhode Island have very high incidences of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses: and
- WHEREAS, cases of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses are increasing at an alarming rate; and
- **WHEREAS**, surveillance has demonstrated a high correlation of the incidence of disease with the abundance of ticks and their geographic distribution; and
- WHEREAS, the prevention of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses is best accomplished by a combination of public awareness, personal protection, and environmental measures; and
- WHEREAS, laboratory tests for Lymc disease and other tick-borne illnesses are not definitive and consensus guidelines for diagnosis and treatment of long-term Lyme disease have yet to be developed; and
- WHEREAS, the Jamestown Town Council recognizes the seriousness and prevalence of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses within southern New England; and
- WHEREAS, the Jamestown Town Council encourages state and regional surveillance efforts and prevention initiatives that will provide a greater understanding of the transmission of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Jamestown Town Council will reinstate the Jamestown Tick Taskforce for the purpose of developing an education plan and a plan of action to address the increase in Lyme disease and other tick-borne disease cases, with a focus on the importance of public awareness, personal protection, and environmental measures.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that new membership and appointments are sought for the newly formed Tick Fask Force and that the Jamestown Town Council encourages resident participation:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Jamestown Town Council calls for increased federal funding for studies pertaining to the development of improved testing and treatment for Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses.

BE IT **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Town of Jamestown asks for support from our State Legislature to direct the Rhode Island Department of Health to provide for the expansion of efforts concerning the prevention, education, treatment and research activities relative to Lyme and other tick-borne diseases.

About Lyme disease

Lyme disease is a tickborne bacterial disease, causing symptoms such as fever, headache, fatigue, and a characteristic bullseye rash. Late symptoms can include arthritis, neurological problems, and heart disease. Lyme disease can be successfully treated with a course of antibiotics. Lyme disease is transmitted by the blacklegged ("deer") tick, mostly in upper Midwest and Northeast states, in wooded or grassy areas, and during warm months. MORE INFORMATION ABOUT LYME DISEASE

Data Overview

- Reported cases of Lyme remained stable from 2017-2021, however reported cases increased by over 230% in 2022 with much of this significant increase attributed to the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) case definition change for Lyme disease.
- o In 2022, Rhode Island had 2,326 cases of Lyme disease, with an incidence rate of 212 cases per 100,000 people. The 5-year mean rate for Lyme disease for 2017-2021, reporting years before the CSTE case definition change, was 92 per 100,000 people.
- Washington County consistently has the highest rate of Lyme disease in Rhode Island with a rate of 608 cases per 100,000 people in 2018. The five-year mean rate for Lyme disease in Washington County for 2017-2021, reporting years before the CSTE case definition change, was 204 per 100,000 people.
- o Most Lyme disease cases are reported during the summer months, with a peak observed during July.

About Anaplasmosis and Ehrlichiosis

Anaplasmosis and ehrlichiosis are tickborne, bacterial diseases that typically cause fever,
headache, fatigue, and muscle aches one-two weeks following a tick bite. Anaplasmosis is most
common in the upper Midwest and Northeast states, corresponding with the geographical
distribution of Lyme disease. Co-infections are possible as the blacklegged ("deer") tick that
carries the bacteria can also transmit Lyme disease and babesiosis. Ehrlichiosis is most common
in the Southeast and Southcentral US, corresponding with the geographical distribution of the
Lone Star tick which transmits the disease. However, the range of the Lone Star tick has been
expanding and these ticks have been found in Rhode Island and other Northeast states. MORE
INFORMATION ABOUT EHRLICHIOSIS

Data Overview

- o In 2022, Rhode Island had 63 cases of anaplasmosis, with a rate of 5.7 cases per 100,000 people, and 16 cases of ehrlichiosis with a rate of 1.5 cases per 100,000 people. This calculates to a combined 79 cases, with a combined rate of 7.2 cases per 100,000 people.
- The five-year mean for combined anaplasmosis and ehrlichiosis cases for 2017-2021, reporting years before the CSTE case definition change, was 182.6 cases, with a five-year mean rate of 16.6 cases per 100,000 people.
- o In 2022, RIDOH implemented the CDC case report form for Tickborne Rickettsial Diseases deployed for use in 2020, which isolates the patient clinical evidence of disease used for identifying case status in accordance with the CSTE case definition.
- o Anaplasmosis and ehrlichiosis occur consistently at the highest rate in Washington County.
- The majority of anaplasmosis and ehrlichiosis cases are reported during the summer months, with a peak observed during June and July.

About Babesiosis

 Babesiosis is a tickborne, parasitic disease caused by protozoa. Symptoms range from subclinical to life-threatening and mimic malaria, appearing one to nine weeks after the bite of an infected blacklegged ("deer") tick. Many infected people have no symptoms; others experience flu-like symptoms such as fever, chills, sweats, headache, body aches, loss of appetite, nausea, or fatigue. Ticks that carry babesia are the most commonly found and cause disease in the Northeast and upper Midwest states, in wooded or grassy areas, and during warm months when they are in their nymphal life stage. MORE INFORMATION ABOUT BABESIOSIS

Data Overview

- In 2018, there were 118 cases of babesiosis in Rhode Island, with an incidence rate of 10.81 cases per 100,000 people.
- Babesiosis is most commonly reported in older male adults, and Washington County has the highest case rate.
- Babesiosis in Rhode Island peaks in the summer months, with 77% of cases occurring between June and August in 2022.
- Babesiosis became nationally reportable in 2011. With more years of surveillance, an overall trend in disease distribution may become clearer. However, in recent years case counts have remained fairly consistent.

Data Source

Extracted from Rhode Island National Electronic Disease Surveillance System in April 2023. Probable and confirmed cases are based on lab work reported to the Rhode Island Department of Health.

Data Notes

 The 2022 Lyme disease case count increase is a direct result of the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) Lyme disease case definition change for 2022. Rhode Island is a Lyme disease high incidence state and is reporting cases based on laboratory results per the new case definition guidance.

Subject: Summary of Aims and a Suggested Campaign

I. Task Force Objective

The Jamestown Tick Task Force has one over arching objective. That is to reduce the incidence of Lyme and other tick borne diseases on Conanicut Island.

- II. Summary of Action Steps
- 1. To shape and conduct a campaign to inform the Jamestown public of the extent of the public health crisis engendered by infected ticks.
- 2. And to inform the public on the nature of the disease and on ways to identify it early
- 3. And to inform the public on steps that individuals and families can take to protect themselves and their property.
- 4. Then, to identify means to reduce the presence of infected ticks by means other than deer herd management.
- 5. And, after ensuring that an island wide consensus has developed, and if deemed appropriate, to conduct a program of deer herd reduction.

III. Proposed Education Campaign Steps

- A yearlong campaign in the Jamestown Press that profiles individuals impacted by the disease, practitioners in the field who have treated hundreds/thousands of impacted patients, experts in the spread and control of Lyme disease.
- Weekly ½ page ad, ideally in the same position in the publication.
 Since this would be public service advertising, endeavor for free or reduced fees.

- The ads would be simple close up photos, testimonial, hotline #, website address; finding 52 people will require a process of discovery.
- A continuously updated website and social media feed (Facebook, Twitter) are essential and serve to keep a continual focus on the concern.
- A package of information should be made available for free at outlets throughout the island such as the bank, the hardware store, drugstore, Cathryn Jameson, etc. The package should be a folder with information on how to prevent oneself from getting Lyme, treatment, websites and phone #s for more information, a visual on how to recognize the ticks, and broader issues such as how other locales have successfully eradicated/reduced the problem (if one of the options is to cull the herd and info unequivocally shows this has a positive outcome, here is where it would be introduced).
- The package should also be made available online and could be sent to anyone who requests it.
- A series of 4 panel discussions should take place at the library at strategic points throughout the year. The panelists should all be experts in the field and the focus is not the debilitating impact of the disease on humans nor treatment options for humans but should squarely be focused on what an island like Jamestown can do to bring the problem under control.

The campaign materials need to be hard hitting, as do the ads. Regardless of the approach the island ultimately takes (pesticides, culling, combination), if we don't have a shock value in the messaging people won't pay attention.

Think about the evolution of warnings on the side of cigarette packages. From "smoking may be harmful" to "smoking causes low birth weight" to basically "smoking will kill you". Only when the end game was ratcheted up did the smoking rate begin to come down in an appreciable way.

Same with texting. It kills if you're driving. And now that message is everywhere, in very powerful ways.

Following last night's discussion regarding the tree located on the Steamboat ROW, I ask that you follow up with the below items as soon as possible. As indicated by the Town Council, they would like a final resolution on October 16. I would need a response on all matters from you no later than October 11th.

A detailed description of the cabling plan including details as to the equipment to be installed. This must be reviewed by the Tree Warden.

A commitment from you that you will contract with a licensed arborist to provide annual inspection and report such to the Town Annual inspections would be reviewed by the Town Tree Warden.

A commitment that any future cabling and/or maintenance of the tree would be at your expense.

A commitment that you will transfer all responsibilities associated with the tree to any future owner of your property. If so agreed, the Town would require an MOU to include a date certain (10/23) of which the work must be performed.

Based upon the recommendations of our insurance carrier (RITRUST), I also ask that you contact your insurance company and ask that they develop a Hold harmless & Indemnification policy which would include all claims for liability related to this tree brought by you or third parties regardless if they on your property or within the right of way or nearby properties. Our current insurance limit requirements are \$2/\$5 Million. This policy must be provided to the Town and maintained for the life of the tree. Please feel free to have your agent contact me directly if necessary.

Thanks for forwarding this to The Trust for a Risk Management opinion. We have also had Andrew Murray, Trust's General Counsel, look at this since it involves a written agreement, already executed, between the Town and Mr. & Mrs. Rosati.

In review of the attachments, a red maple tree in the Steamboat Street R-O-W was deemed to be a hazard by Town's Tree Warden and recommended for removal. This tree appears to be a Town-owned tree, on Town property that happens to be a R-O-W near a shoreline. To eliminate <u>all risk</u> of loss against the Town, the only proper risk management decision would be for the complete removal of the tree.

Based on the agreement already executed, the Town is allowing Mr. & Mrs. Rosati to "secure" the tree by method of cabling, through the services of a licensed arborists at their expense. While we understand the third bullet point cited in the May 30th agreement, The Town must understand that the Rosatis cannot release a third party's claim against the Town, whether or not that third party is on their property. The Rosatis can only release claims that they would have for property damage or bodily injury. The only proper way of securing that the Rosatis will remain responsible for third party actions contemplated by this bullet point, is for them to agree to defend and hold harmless the Town from those actions. A Hold Harmless & Indemnification Agreement should be drafted by the Town's solicitor memorializing this arrangement and the Rosatis should execute the same. The Trust would recommend that this agreement include all claims for this tree's liability brought by third parties regardless of where they are (on the Rosati's property or in the R-O-W). If they are not willing to go into the R-O-W, The Town mains responsible for all claims brought by a third party in the R-O-W.

Also, it is worth noting that the agreement is silent with respect to the Town's right of inspection of the cable installation by the licensed arborist and that it meets the Town's satisfaction. Even though the Town is the owner of this tree, given this arrangement, the Town should preserve its rights for this inspection as well as the rights to remove said tree, in the event the

Town is not satisfied with the installation/workmanship/integrity of the cabling by the arborist. The agreement is also silent about future cabling inspections, future costs to repair/adjust cables, etc.

Further, based on the agreement, The Town remains responsible for a tree it owns and has deemed hazardous. The Town will need to have regular inspections of the tree for maintenance and care including cable inspections. The documents exchanged do not transfer the Town's liability for injury or property damage caused by this tree to a third party who may use the R-O-W as shoreline access. While the 'cabling' of the tree can be assumed by Mr. & Mrs. Rosati, the agreement doesn't absolve the Town against claims by third parties at all.

Finally, The Town may also want to require that the Rosatis submit a Certificate of Insurance, on an annual basis, naming the Town as an additional insured to satisfy the fourth bullet point of this agreement.

CHRISTINA D. COLLINS FINANCE DIRECTOR Sec. 22-91. - Appeals and adjustments.

Any adjustment of the standards required by this article or an appeal of a decision of the tree warden shall be heard by the tree preservation and protection committee. All appeals shall be in writing to the tree preservation and protection committee shall hold a public hearing at some suitable time and place after giving notice to all persons known to be interested therein and posting the hearing in the town hall and also at the location the hearing is to be held seven days (including the day of the hearing) prior to the hearing. Within three days after the hearing, the tree preservation and protection committee shall render the decision granting or denying the appeal. Any appeal of a decision of the tree preservation and protection committee shall be heard by the town council.

(Code 2003, § 22-91; Ord. of 3-15-2002, § 08; Ord. of 12-10-2007)

Sec. 22-143. - Clearance of public rights-of-way.

- (a) Every person who is the owner of land abutting a public walkway shall keep such walkway free of all vegetation from ground level up to a height of at least eight feet above the walkway. This shall include any tree under public or private control, which overhangs a public walkway. A public walkway shall mean any walkway that is improved by gravel, asphalt or concrete. A public walkway shall also include established dirt paths in public rights-of-way.
- (b) Planting of trees along highways, rights-of-way, and on town land will take into consideration General Tree Planting Rules and Guidelines and Rules and Regulations for Subdivisions of Land, Town of Jamestown, Rhode Island. A notice to any abutter to a planting of a new tree, but not replacement of trees, that potentially would obstruct a property owner's view of Narragansett Bay shall be sent not less than 30 days in advance of the planting to the address on record in the tax assessor's office and shall advise the abutter of the appeal process outlined in section 22-143.

I understand that an old, stately red maple tree is slated for removal on the western section of the Steamboat Street right-of-way. It is been cited, as I understand, as a liability risk. I am aware that the town's tree warden has rendered the decision to remove the tree based on his opinion of its condition. As I understand it, two other licensed arborists have declared the tree to be healthy. In addition, an abutter has offered to pay for pruning and cabling (at a personal cost of over \$2700.00) to preserve the tree and yet the tree is to come down.

I have attended a number of Tree Preservation and Protection Committee meetings over the past few months in defense of the tree. I have been told that the stump and root system will remain to prevent erosion of the coastal edge and ROW and that, at least, one tree will be planted to replace the red maple. Please let me say that I admire the work of that committee and believe that they have done their due diligence. But in the face of liability issues they had little choice but to support the tree's removal.

I would like to know the extent of the danger the tree may provide. It has been there a very long time. The tree has weathered any number of storms and hurricanes and yet is still standing. I have no interest in seeing persons injured or property damaged but I am concerned that cutting down the tree may be a tad drastic. Especially, when a private citizen has offered to pay for a licensed arborist to remove the trunk noted as 'rotten" and provide cabling to secure the upper limbs.

SUBJECT: Report for Town Council Meeting October 16, 2023

Short-Term Rental Registration: We are finalizing the on-line registration process this week. Staff has begun scheduling inspections beginning the week of October 16. This will be done incrementally through the next several weeks. The Clerk will then advertise the completed applications and schedule hearings for the Town Council to consider during December.

Beavertail Lighthouse Ceremony: GSA along with RIDEM have scheduled a ceremony to recognize the transfer of the Beavertail Lighthouse and property from the US Government to RIDEM. The event is scheduled for 10 AM on October 24. This will now allow the Town, Beavertail Lighthouse Museum Assocation and RIDEM to develop a long-term lease agreement for the management of the property.

Tax Abatement Update: Tax abatements that are offered to property owners including seniors, veterans and members are the fire department are covered under both local ordinances and RI General Law. Both areas are in need of revisions. Staff is working to develop a recommendation to the Town Council.

Code Enforcement Officer: The part-time code enforcement officer is expected to begin working next week. He will work one day per week under the supervision of the building/zoning official.

DATE: September 11, 2023

At a meeting of the Jamestown Planning Commission held Wednesday, July 5. 2023 the Planning Commission unanimously voted to approve the Final Draft of the 2023 Update/Rewrite, as amended, including approving the following motion and voting to recommend the Town Council approve the 2023 Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance and that said amendments are consistent with the Jamestown Comprehensive Plan, including the goals and policies stated, the implementation program, and all other applicable elements of the comprehensive plan; and demonstrates a recognition and consideration of each of the applicable purposes of zoning, as presented in R.I. General Laws § 45-24-30.

Subsequently, additional changes were made to the Accessory Dwelling Unit Section 82-1201 to ensure compliance with the most recent RIGL changes. This section was approved by the Planning Commission at their September 6, 2023 meeting and is incorporated into the attached Final Draft.

We would request that the Town Council accept this Final Draft for review followed by scheduling the public hearing required prior to adoption of this Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Jamestown.

The Planning Commission approval is based on the following Findings of Fact. Consistency with the Comprehensive Plan and Consistency with the Rhode Island Zoning Enabling Act:

A. FINDINGS OF FACT

The Planning Commission hereby finds the following evidence in support of amendments to the Jamestown Zoning Ordinance (the "Zoning Ordinance") related to the maintenance of the rural character of Jamestown as its number one goal in the Comprehensive Community Plan.

- 1. The Jamestown Town Council approved a motion to award the bid for the Update/re-write of the Zoning Ordinance Project to Horsley Witten Group, Inc. (HWG) for \$59,960 on November 6, 2017. Project kickoff then started.
- 2. On June 11, 2021, Jamestown entered into an amendment to the contract with HWG to include legal review for \$12,000 for a total contract price of \$71,960

- 3. Planning Commission reviewed the ordinance and the potential amendments with HWG until February 2020 and then again after legal review beginning June 2022 at 22 public meetings and 2 public workshops in March and April 2023.
- 4. On July 5, 2023, the Planning Commission approved the Amendments to the Ordinance in the draft dated May 31, 2023 and again on September 6, 2023 and forwarded the document to the Town Council for hearing and adoption.

- (4) Providing for the control, protection, and/or abatement of air, water, groundwater, and noise pollution, and soil erosion and sedimentation.
- (5) Providing for the protection of the natural, historic, cultural, and scenic character of the city or town or areas in the municipality.
- (6) Providing for the preservation and promotion of agricultural production, forest, silviculture, aquaculture, timber resources, and open space.
- (7) Providing for the protection of public investment in transportation, water, stormwater management systems, sewage treatment and disposal, solid waste treatment and disposal, schools, recreation, public facilities, open space, and other public requirements.
- (8) Promoting a balance of housing choices, for all income levels and groups, to assure the health, safety and welfare of all citizens and their rights to affordable, accessible, safe, and sanitary housing.
- (9) Providing opportunities for the establishment of low- and moderate-income housing.

- (11) Promoting a high level of quality in design in the development of private and public facilities.

- (13) Providing for coordination of land uses with contiguous municipalities, other municipalities, the state, and other agencies, as appropriate, especially with regard to resources and facilities that extend beyond municipal boundaries or have a direct impact on that municipality.
- (14) Providing for efficient review of development proposals, to clarify and expedite the zoning approval process.
- (15) Providing for procedures for the administration of the zoning ordinance, including, but not limited to, variances, special-use permits, and, where adopted, procedures for modifications.

a. Zoom with Julie Brunner of OPAL, the Orcas Island Community Land Trust The committee had a Zoom meeting with Julie Brunner of OPAL, the Orcas Island Community Land Trust. Brunner described that OPALs mission is to maintain the character, vibrancy and diversity of Orcas Island community by answering the ongoing need for permanently affordable housing. They have created 110 homeownership units and OPAL owns 90 rental units. Orcas Island has a population of 5,000 people and the incomes are not low, but the wages are low. She said to get units (built) now and hit the ground running.

Plain asked how they acquired property. Brunner said that they buy it. Plain said that Jamestown is looking into the Town buying the land like a reverse mortgage, and the resident's maintain ownership of the house. The municipality will get the affordable housing credit with the State. Brunner said that she discourages a municipality from owning without a spin-off plan because politics and policies of the town can change. She also gave the optics that the town is buying land out from under seniors.

Case asked about OPAL's funding. Brunner said that they are a local small non-profit that does fundraising and doesn't generally use federal funds, but get some funds from state housing trust. They ask local people for money directly and do not have events. They do not have real estate transfer tax. Their CLT is a community-controlled entity, anyone can be a member and 1/3 of their board are OPAL homeowners. Plain asked how they approach property owners? Brunner said that they call them up, sell the program and appeal to their best selves.

Plain asked Brunner if she knew of any municipally owned programs? She said that Salt Lake City didn't finish their project.

Brunner suggested that our committee also look at Minneapolis' Project Sustained Legacy as an example of another community land trust. Vail, CO is another community that came up with 10 good ideas.

Brunner said that she likes the town's idea but to think bigger. She said to think that it is possible. She said that deals take a long time and each one is different. She said to get our hands on properties now. She said to do an analysis to see how big the problem is. She said to have a meeting with target population in the room and those who are struggling to find housing.

Discussion of take-aways from Zoom meeting with Julie Brunner of OPAL, the Orcas Island Community Land Trust ensued. Bryer said that it is helpful that OPAL has a very dedicated executive director. Quaker Case, not present at the meeting, provided a memo that pointed out that OPAL raises money. Plain said that it is worth exploring. Bryer brought up that it is easier to raise money when there is not a location determined and it is not contentious.

Plain said that the idea of "go big or go home" stuck out to him from the discussion with Brunner. Pritchard said that "move quickly" and Bryer said "don't talk about it, get it done" were also take-aways. One item brought up on the Zoom that Plain didn't necessarily like, but understood, is that people do not trust the government. Pritchard brought up that things in Town can change with a new council and a new council may not want to fund programs anymore.

Discussion of no interest loans to build ensued. Pritchard brought up the idea of no interest loans to build and the build must be affordable for a certain number of years. Plain said that South Kingstown does something similar with ADUs. In South

Kingstown, deed restricted affordable ADU, are not taxed on the improvements. Market rate ADUs are not taxed for 5 years and no one has built a deed restricted ADU and there have been 12 market rate ADU built. Bryer said that Jamestown has had an affordable dwelling unit Ordinance in place since 2009 an no one has built a deed restricted affordable unit and there have been 25 AFDUs built through that separate provision. Bryer explained that the town is currently updating the Zoning Ordinance. The State Legislature did not make any changes to the ADU law in the last session. Plain would like to be notified when the ADUs goes before the Town Council so he can bring up the no-tax rate for affordable units.

Discussion ensued regarding Community Land Trust/Jamestown Sustainable Resident Program. Questions were raised if the program should be town-run or private? Plain and Bryer will speak with Meagher about the next steps and including the Town Council. Purchasing property and paying the owners for the land is one piece of the Community Land Trust and just one tool in toolbox. The Conanicut Island Land Trust (CLT) that we serves a different function., with land conservation. Could CLT help with affordable housing? Pritchard will speak to Quentin Anthony, president of the CLT.

III. Old Business

1. Jamestown Zoning Ordinance update - review, discussion and/or action and/or vote
A. Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) - review, discussion and/or action and/or vote
Bryer explained to the Planning Commission that they approved the Zoning Ordinance Update at
their meeting in July understanding that changes would be made to the ADU section removing
the "family" aspect. Bryer stated that there was significant enough changes and she had time
send it back to the Planning Commission to review prior to submission to the Town Council so
that is why we are reviewing it tonight. The revision meets the intents of the State law and if the
law changes in the future, then the ordinance will be updated then. There is no longer a review
process with a TRC meeting, just the Building Official reviewing the submitted plans for
compliance with the ordinance when applicants apply for a building permit. The notifications
have also been removed. Restrictions on utilities are no longer allowed by State Law.
Limitations on the number of bedrooms allowed in a dwelling unit are no longer allowed by
State Law. The revised standards were discussed.

The uses and districts in table 6-1 were discussed. Swistak noted that ADUs are not listed in the CL zone as a permitted use, but there is abundant residential within the CL zone. It was determined that the CL zone should permit ADU use and table will be amended. Discussion ensued regarding length of rentals within an ADU. The ordinance states that ADUs must be made available for long-term lease for one-year or more. Discussion of septic systems ensued. The number of bedrooms permitted on a property is based on DEM regulations for a dwelling unit with a septic system. Lots located with the High Groundwater district will still have to meet the requirements of the High Groundwater Ordinance.

Discussion of water supply management plan ensued. Bryer said that she is working with Mike Gray, Director of Public Works, to update water supply management plan and build out analysis to include the potential for ADUs. The current plan does not have unrestricted ADUs as a factor. A question that Commissioner Pendlebury asked to get answered in the updated plan, what is the total population that we can support for the water system and wells?

Bob Plain of 18 Calvert Place spoke to the Planning Commission. He said that he believes the Town is moving in the right direction with ADUs. He said that there are positive externalities and to not focus just on the negative aspects of ADUs. He said that young people don't live here anymore because no real way to create rental housing. He gave the example of how South Kingstown does not increase property tax when an ADU is built and in the last three years there have been 12 non-family ADUs built. He thinks that, in Jamestown, the majority will continue to be built for children or parents. He said that it is important for local workers, like McQuade's Marketplace and Cumberland Farms, to have a place to live. It is important to have a mix of economic diversity and welcome people who are not extremely affluent. ADUs as rentals are a tool in the toolbox that can help with Affordable Housing and part of the Comp Plan is to create more rental housing.

Bryer said that M on third page should be removed because Solicitor Ruggiero and Solicitor Brochu do not think it is necessary. It was discussed and agreed that it will be removed.

Solicitor Brochu questioned the term family member in N on third page. Discussion ensued. The new sentence reads: "All ADUs and Accessory Family Dwelling Units formerly granted through this Ordinance, if rented, must be made available for long term occupancy through a long-term lease of one-year or more."

A motion was moved by Commissioner Swistak and seconded by Commissioner Enright to approve the amended Accessory Dwelling Units Ordinance with the following three changes: in Table 6-1. CL changes from "N" to "Y"; strike paragraph M; change wording in paragraph N. All in favor.

Bryer said that the next meeting on September 20 is the public hearing for Hammett Court. The meeting for October 4 is cancelled. There is tentatively a high groundwater application on October 18.

Re: Request for Property Tax Abatement

Dear Ms. Brochu:

The Jamestown Arts Center (JAC) would like to request an exemption from Jamestown property taxes. The Jamestown Arts Center is a tax-exempt non-profit organization registered with the state of Rhode Island, operating under IRS section 501(c)(3).

Our property is located at 18 Valley Street.

The Rhode Island Statute, R.I. Gen. Laws § 44-3-3, governs tax abatement and taxation and what properties might be exempt from taxation. § C provides that:

Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, in an effort to provide relief for businesses, including small businesses, and to promote economic development, a city, town, or fire district, may establish an exemption for tangible personal property within its geographic limits by formal action of the appropriate governing body within the city, town, or fire districts, which exemptions shall be uniformly applied and in compliance with local tax classification requirements.

§ 25 provides that:

Subject to the authorization by formal action of the council of any city or town, any real or personal property owned by, held in trust for, or leased to an organization incorporated under R.I. Gen. Laws § 7-6-1 et seq. Chapter 6 of Title 7, as amended, or an organization meeting the definition of charitable trust, or an organization incorporated under the not for profit statutes of another state or the District of Columbia, the purpose of which is conserving open space.

The Jamestown Arts Center is formed under the auspices of this section of Rhode Island General Laws.

Additionally, Title 22 of the Rhode Island General Laws defines "small business." Under this section, R.I. Gen. Laws § 22-7.6-1(15), a small business is a person, partnership, corporation, or other form of business entity independently owned and operated, not dominant in its field, in which business employs 500 or fewer employees and has its principal place of business located in the State of Rhode Island.

The Jamestown Arts Center offers year-round arts programming ranging from outdoor and indoor art exhibitions; to classes, workshops, and camps; and theatre, music, and dance performances. JAC arts and cultural activities draw thousands of residents and visitors to the village of Jamestown each year, supporting local businesses and economic development in the community. As a nonprofit facing significant operating expense increases, the JAC would benefit from relief of property tax expenses.

For all of the above reasons, the Jamestown Arts Center respectfully suggests that it is an entity within the meaning of Rhode Island General Laws eligible for tax exemption status.

Subject: Open Space and Pickleball Courts

Dear Town Councilors.

As Chair of the Jamestown Conservation Commission for over 26 years we worked tirelessly to preserve and protect important open space and farmland on Conanicut Island. Open space in the Town watershed had a high priority for obvious reasons. With less than a one square mile watershed it is critical that these properties be protected from any activity other than passive recreational and conservation uses.

I was extremely concerned by the article in last weeks Jamestown Press suggesting that potential sites (AP 4, Lots 86 & 98) might be considered for pickleball courts. Both properties are located in the Town watershed, are currently open space and used for passive recreation.

Development of pickleball courts in this area would require alteration of the land, and the creation of additional impervious surfaces in the watershed increasing the potential for contaminated runoff to enter our drinking water supply. This active recreational use is also not compatible with the intended use of our Town watershed area and will "open the door" for future requests to expand this recreational area further endangering our drinking water supply.

Of deeper concern is the notion that the Town would consider asking RI DEM to modify deed restrictions that came with the acquisition of these properties. When the Town acquired this property through the State Open Space Program it was the intent to keep this property open for "educational, research and passive recreation" only. Many properties on Conanicut Island were protected over the years as open space with similar deed restrictions that were agreed upon by the Town and/or the private owners. All were comforted that these properties would remain "as is" for present and future generations.

Requesting any change to previously agreed upon deed restrictions is not consistent with previous intentions of the Town, Conservation Commission, Conanicut Island Land Trust, RIDEM, the Nature Conservancy, Audubon Society of RI or other organizations

involved with land preservation and protection on Conanicut Island. Changing or modifying deed restrictions sends a clear message to these organizations and the residents of Jamestown that it could happen again and no "protected" property is safe. Alteration of deed restrictions will also affect the willingness of property owners to work with the Town in future land preservation and/or protection efforts.

As a person who was very active in the land preservation movement on Conanicut Island for many years I respectfully request that any consideration of locating pickleball courts or any other active recreational activity in this area be dismissed.
